



It's scary the amount of batteries that don't get recycled!

MINISTER FOR THE ENVIRONMENT, Community and Local Government Phil Hogan T.D today (Wednesday 26th October) launched a new campaign to remind everyone to "Bring Batteries Back", a nationwide initiative to encourage more battery recycling in Ireland. WEEE Ireland, the compliance scheme responsible for WEEE (Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment) and waste battery recycling will be facilitating the campaign through their network of battery collection boxes in retail outlets, recycling centres and other collection points throughout Waterford City and county.

With Halloween only a few days away, WEEE Ireland are using the season to remind Irish people of the "scary" consequences of not recycling used batteries. Batteries contain potentially harmful chemicals and heavy metals, and can cause damage to the environment if not recycled properly. WEEE Ireland has already held a series of collection days throughout Waterford in 2011 that were hugely successful, and it is hoped that the Déise will continue this good recycling behaviour during Halloween and beyond!

It is estimated that if each person in Ireland were to bring just one battery back for recycling to their retailer, even without purchasing new ones, or to their local recycling centre, an incredible 100 tonnes would be diverted from Ireland's landfill. A recent survey carried out by Empathy Research revealed that 90%* of Irish people were aware that irresponsible disposal of batteries can have negative environmental consequences.

This campaign is a call to action for everyone in the lead up to one of the busiest times for the year for battery consumption to look through drawers, check toys and appliances for necessary replacements and bring all waste batteries back to your closest free recycling location.

Speaking at the launch of the campaign, Phil Hogan, T.D, Minister for the Environment, Community and Local Government said "Ireland has a strong reputation among its European neighbours for being environmentally aware but we can certainly do more when it comes to the responsible recycling of



batteries. Considering the negative impact that waste batteries has on the environment if disposed of incorrectly, it is concerning that such a high percentage is still being sent to landfill. With the support of ERP and WEEE Ireland, I am confident that Irish people will embrace this initiative."

"Although we are one of the top countries in Europe for electrical recycling, there is still a large volume of waste batteries being unnecessarily sent to landfill every year. We are encouraging everyone in Waterford to join in the bring batteries back campaign to show the public just how easy it is to recycle batteries either through their local recycling centre, free local collection days or in their nearest WEEE registered retail outlet." added Leo Donovan, CEO WEEE Ireland.

The survey was carried out online from 13-22nd Sept 2011 among members of Empathy Research's IdeasPanel through their Omnibuzz® survey which was quota controlled to be nationally representative of 18+ year olds in the Republic of Ireland. Total participants 1,002.
